TEACHING MOMENT

from Bob Jones

The number 40 appears often in the Bible. Because 40 appears often in contexts dealing with judgment or testing, many people understand it to be the number of "probation" or "trial". This does not mean that 40 is entirely symbolic; it still has a literal meaning in Scripture. "Forty days" means "40 days", but it does mean that God has chosen this number to help emphasize times of trouble and hardship.

Here are examples of the Bible's use of the number 40 that stress the theme of testing or judgement:

- In Old Testament, God destroyed the earth with water. He caused it to rain for 40 days and nights (Genesis 7:12)
- After Moses killed the Egyptian, he fled to Midian spending 40 years in the desert tending flocks (Acts 7:30)
- Moses was on Mount Sinai for 40 days and nights (Exodus 24:18)
- Moses interceded on Israel's behalf in freeing them from Pharaoh for 40 days and nights (Deuteronomy 9:18,25)
- The Law specified a maximum number of lashes received for a crime, setting the limit at 40 (Deuteronomy 25:3)
- The Israelite spies took 40 days and nights to spy out Canaan (Numbers 13:25)
- The Israelites wandered for 40 years (Deuteronomy 8:2-5)
- Before Sampson's deliverance, the Israelites served the Philistines for 40 years (Judges 13:1)
- Goliath taunted Israel's army for 40 days before David arrived to slay him (1 Samuel 17:16)
- When Elijah fled from Jezebel, he traveled 40 days and nights to Mount Horeb (1 Kings 19:8)
- The number 40 also appears in the prophecies of Ezekiel (4:6, 29:11-13) and Jonah (3:4)
- In the New Testament, Jesus was tempted for 40 days and nights (Matthew 4:2)
- There were 40 days between Jesus' resurrection and ascension (Acts 1:3)



Dakota, A Spiritual Geography by Kathleen Norris



If you have read a book by Kathleen Norris, you know that Norris' books are thoughtful, insightful, and just plain interesting! Our library has three books-"Dakota, A Spiritual Geography," "The Cloister Walk," and "Amazing Grace."
In Dakota, Norris relays her experience of moving into her grandmother's home in Lemmon, South Dakota. As in "Amazing Grace", her book is a series of essays, all linked together with the common theme of living on the plains and growing personally and spiritually. Good quote: "In choosing a bare bones existence, we are

enriched, and can redefine success as an internal process rather than an outward display of wealth and power." And a funny one: "In spite of the cost of living, it's still popular."

Men's Brotherhood Notes: March... On March 21 we had our regular monthly meeting. Susan Hugghins from the Wycliffe Bible Translators gave the program on her work in Oaxaca Mexico. She had a slide presentation which showed the people of the area helping and working together to translate the Bible into the local Mixtec language. April...The monthly meeting will be on April 25. Encourage anyone to come; bring a friend! There is always a great meal and warm fellowship.

Prayer Concerns: Pray for the local folks suffering from flooding and other weather-related concerns. A particularly tough time for the farmers in our area among others.

Action: If you are able to, look for ways to help folks with their flood-related issues or donate money to helping agencies such as the Red Cross or other local relief efforts.

Where is your Spiritual Center? In the Beatitudes, Jesus admonishes us to be sure to put God and the wishes of God ahead of all else. Money and wealth, more or less, represent the pulls of this world that can interfere with our doing the will of God - Matt 6:24.

In Timothy, we are admonished to be aware that the love of money may cause us the drift away from having God at the center of our lives. (1 Timothy 6:10 For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs.) Notice Timothy does not say the money itself is the root, it is the *love of money*, pursuing wealth whether it be in actual monetary form, the power of wealth, or the prestige it brings, it draws us away from serving God with our whole hearts, instead placing Him and His wishes in a secondary role.

In Hebrews 13: 5 we are told that God will never leave us nor forsake us. If we are pursuing wealth for the security it brings, are we misplacing our trust? See the parable of the Rich Fool in Luke 12: 16-21. Here a man had so much money he did not know what to do with it. He gave it over to himself to pursue selfish interests. He may likely have thought the wealth will never end and he can just relax and enjoy himself with little or no regard to others perhaps neglecting the desires and wishes of God in his life. And then he died suddenly. There is no assurance that being generous in this life will ensure that we live one more minute. However, when we are asked to give an accounting of what we did in this life, self-centered pursuits at the top of our list may be a bit humiliating.

During this season of Lent, we need to be reflective of our lives and what we are accomplishing according to God's will. Jesus died that we may live. But how to live? God does not want us to live like ascetics but to have a balance as He told us in Matthew 22 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' Nothing wrong with taking care of your own needs but don't forget those less fortunate, who are suffering. Whether it be wealth or time, we must be engaged in helping others. In looking away from only our own self, we will find our Spiritual Center.

Susan's Saga

A remarkable bill has been unanimously passed by the South Dakota State Senate: an initiative to recognize the official indigenous language of the state. The proposal is that the language of the Seven Council Fires, also known by treaty as the Great Sioux Nation, comprised of three dialects, Lakota, Dakota, and Nakota, be designated as the official indigenous language of the state.

If signed into law, South Dakota would be the first state in the lower 48 to identify a native language.

The bill would not change anything in terms of what language is used or made available on state forms or elsewhere.

Nonetheless, it reaffirms the traditional territory and roots of the state that bears the name of Dakota.

This initiative is very much in tune with the momentum of 2019, which has been declared as the International Year of Indigenous Languages. This observance "aims to raise awareness of the consequences of the endangerment of indigenous languages across the world, with an aim to establish a link between language, development, peace, and reconciliation."

"Despite their immense value, languages around the world continue to disappear at an alarming rate. With this in mind, the United Nations" made this declaration to highlight "the important contribution" languages "make to our world's rich cultural diversity."

In keeping with this movement, we are also endeavoring to document and promote the use of an endangered language in Oaxaca, Mexico. God's message found in the Bible is for each language. Given that, people should be able to read God's message in the language they understand best.

PRISON MINISTRY NEWSLETTER March 2019

Life is full of spiritual battles. Hopefully through the battles we are growing stronger in our faith walk. The evil one wants us to get angry with God for allowing hardships in our lives. I believe it is through the struggles and trials of life that we draw closer to God. It is in the valleys we hear God, because we are seeking God for answers. In difficult times God wants us to learn that His strength is sufficient when we depend on Him. II Cor. 12:9 says, ""My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness."

On February 9 & 10, we held a two-day seminar with the inmates. The sessions were a Louie Giglio video called, "Goliath Must Fall." We watched a twenty minute video and then discussed it. The sessions were very relevant and beneficial to the men! Some of the subjects were: fear, rejection, anger, and addiction. It was very helpful for the inmates because most of them struggle with these issues. These are some of the comments by the men: Bob - "Thank you for hosting the seminar, "Goliath Must Fall". This seminar came at a critical time in my life because I am turning back to my faith and reading the Bible more and more. My giants are slowly beginning to fall. In time I know they will be down with no chance of getting up. Even though I am struggling with PTSD from my mother's tragic death, I now know how to cope and not give the devil a seat at my table." Tom - "I was dealing with a lot of fear and addictions which brought me to prison. The seminar answered many of my questions. I am spiritually hungry to know more about the Lord and this weekend really encouraged me in my walk with Christ!" I believe God used this time to show the men that they can walk in victory!

One young man who I visited with grew up in a religion that believes in many gods. This second time he was incarcerated he decided to start reading the Bible seriously. He attended Bible studies and church. I had an opportunity to go over the gospel with him, drawing it out on paper using Romans 6:23 as the main verse. He was ready to have Christ change his life and prayed for the Lord to forgive him and cleanse him. He continued to fill out the Bible studies I gave him. We talked many times to answer his questions. I could tell he was thirsty for the Lord. He told me about the appearances of ghosts in his life that would paralyze him in fear. Now he knows that through Christ he has victory over fear!

You are a part of God's work at the prison through your prayer & financial support! Your support is a blessing!
