

Counting Our Blessings

Friends,

Over the last couple of months, we have been reading books, blogs, and watching webinars all to help us think about this community we call "the church." We came across segments that echoed much of what the folks from PCUSA Project Regeneration told us about budgeting, and buildings, and the work of the church. We found sources that talk about how to make your church welcoming, how small churches can grow and thrive, and even one book that analyzed how and why churches die and close. All of these can be tools to help us think, over the next year, about what and who this church is called to be. But no amount of knowledge can replace personal, individual commitment on the part of members of this congregation-leaders, members, and friends of this congregation -all can contribute to the life of this church. We ask that you think carefully about your commitment to this church. This month, let's talk about prayer.

For his book "Autopsy of a Deceased Church: 12 Ways to Keep Yours Alive," Thom Rainer interviewed friends and members of churches that had recently closed. One man told Rainer that as he looked back, he remembers one thing that seemed to be the beginning of the end. It was when *the church stopped praying*. He remembered it went from everyone praying, to a small group that met for prayer, and finally to just no genuine prayer. They continued to have corporate prayer during worship, but his church stopped being a church that prayed.

Think about the prayer life of this church. Following church policy, all of our meetings are opened and closed with prayer, we pray regularly during worship service-and these prayers are all important. We have a very strong group of ladies that meet and pray regularly for this church and for the members of this church- which is very good.

However, this should not constitute the fullness of our prayer life. How can each one of us contribute to the prayer life of the church?

It takes intentional effort to pray every dayand it's hard sometimes to think of what to "sav." There is no rule about that- no fancy language is required. Some days, you might simply run through the list of people on your heart and mind and ask for God's love and intervention in their lives. Other days, you could pull out the prayer list from the bulletin and think about and pray for each person on the list. As you meet people or read the paper or watch the news, look for opportunities to pray that God will intervene where there is discord or chaos or where comfort is neededor pray in thanks when you learn of good news! All of these strengthen the prayer life of our church- it helps each of us develop the habit of prayer- the habit of turning to God and trusting in God to walk alongside of us every day.

One of the simplest, yet most important prayers you can pray is simply a request for God to lead you, to guide you, to help you to know what God's will is for your life. We can all grow in our commitment to intentional prayerand I hope that the church- its mission, its leaders and members- will be added to your prayer list and you will pray this simple prayer-God, what is Your will for this congregation and what is my part in Your plan?

We continue to look forward with excitement and anticipation to see what plans God has for us as part of Christ's church. We pray for each one of you and we pray for this church as this unfolds.

Pill Bottles

Matthew 25: Ministries will accept our donation of empty plastic pill bottles for inclusion in their shipments of medical supplies. The pill bottle program fulfills the dual needs of improving medical care in developing countries and caring for our environment. In developing countries, medicines are often dispensed into hands, leaves, or any other available containers. How would you like to have the pharmacist put your pills into your handkerchief to take them home? We will be sending clean, empty plastic pill bottles to help the poorest of the poor with capped, unlabeled, and sterilized containers for their medicines.



In order to reach as many people as possible, Matthew 25: Ministries partners with non-profit organizations in the recipient locations. Through these relationships they ensure that donated goods are shipped to places with true need and distributed by people who are familiar with the area. Matthew 25: Ministries works with more than 40 organizations in the Greater Cincinnati area, groups throughout the United States, and partners in approximately 70 countries worldwide.

That being said, we ask for your help. Women of the church will be meeting a couple of times to clean and package the pills we have collected during this past year of 2023 (approximately 6 boxes). Our first meeting will be **with Sisterhood at the church at noon on Thursday, January 18.** Come fellowship with us! Pizza will be served and we will clean up the pill bottles. At another meeting (date determined later) we will sort and package the bottles for shipment. If you would like to help but cannot make the meetings, you may bring Gallon zip lock bags into which the bottles will be put for shipment OR make a free will donation for pizza and postage.

Susan's Saga

The Incarnation. An amazing concept that infinite, eternal God enters time and space as the divine Infant. Jesus is fully human and fully God. It is logically impossible for our limited human understanding to completely wrap our minds around this profound truth.

In human terms, a new birth is cause for rejoicing, and thus we can readily identify with the joy brought by the Incarnation. During this season of celebrating the Divine birth, we can heartily join in the festivities surrounding the commemoration of Jesus' nativity.

However, even in the midst of the celebration, there is the somber foreshadowing of the reason for the Incarnation: God was born in human form so that there could be the Crucifixion. It is not logically possible for someone to die without having been born. Birth is the necessary prequel for death. Jesus had to be physically born in order to physically die. And He had to physically die in order to be physically resurrected. There is a sequential chain: birth—death—resurrection. Put another way, resurrection opens the way for freedom from death. There can be no death without there having been prior birth.

But why is death necessary with all of its pain and grief? Death is the direct result of sin: disobedience to God. Resistance and rebellion to God's good and perfect plans and purposes for life for humankind has the consequence of death. The penalty for opposing God is both individual and corporate. No one is exempt, "For everyone has sinned; we all fall short of God's glorious standard." The only solution for freedom and release from the morass of cumulative sinfulness in which humanity finds itself mired is the perfect sacrifice of Jesus Christ in His death.

"Christ died for our sins, just at the Scriptures said. He was buried, and he was raised from the dead...." "For sin is the sting that results in death.....But thank God! He gives us victory over sin and death through our Lord Jesus Christ."

"God, in his grace, freely makes us right in his sight. He did this through Christ Jesus when he freed us from the penalty for our sins. For God presented Jesus as the sacrifice for sin. People are made right with God when they believe that Jesus sacrificed his life, shedding his blood." "God did this to demonstrate his righteousness, for he himself is fair and just, and he makes sinners right in his sight when they believe in Jesus."

The Good News of the release from the guilt and death resulting from sin is the real reason for celebrating the joy at the birth of Jesus.

This remarkable gift of the complete provision of redemption, beginning with the birth and culminating in the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus, needs to be made known in every language through Bible translation.
