Session Grace Notes -

During this time of transition between pastors, session ruling elders, deacons, trustees and committees are determined to keep lines of communication open to ensure all church members that we are loved not only by our God, but also by other believers in our congregation.



In addition to elders taking turns to assemble Sunday worship services, church boards and committees display vital information on bulletin boards in the church narthex. Church leaders are also taking turns putting together articles for The Blade about our work.

Much is happening at Brookings First Presbyterian!

Church boards and committees post minutes of their meetings electronically on a computer hosting service called Dropbox. That not only saves paper, but it also makes everything easily accessible when session meets.

While complete session meeting minutes will be posted on a bulletin board, here is a summary of our February 9, 2017 meeting.

<u>Deacons</u> reported great activity serving the needs of our congregation including distributing with Rev. Val Putnam the sacrament of homebound communion to several church members who aren't able to attend worship. As such, 73 people received communion February 5.

<u>Clerk of Session</u> reported that meetings are being held on Mondays with Melanie Shepherd, the church office manager, Dolores Canaday, chair of Deacons, Donna Flint, chair of PNC, David Peterson, church treasurer, and Jeanne Manzer, clerk of session.

<u>Christian Education</u> told plans for Game Night February 19 as well as proposing June dates for VBS. They also plan to solicit youth to attend Youth Rally http://www.presbyteryofsd.org/ministries/youth-rally/

<u>Fellowship</u> plans to coordinate Wednesday Lenten Soup Suppers beginning March 8 with different church committees assigned to setup and cleanup.

<u>Outreach</u> has been placing ads in campus and community newspapers to spread word of our activity. Inside the church building, plans are to make First Presbyterian Church Brookings brochures available from a wall pocket next to the Welcome banner for visitors as well as members to share.

Worship committee plans to change paraments for Lent as well as to organize an Ash Wednesday service.

<u>Mission/Finance</u> keeps on top of receipts and expenditures. Discussion about improving financial return on Endowment Funds continues along with carefully purging old financial files with help from a professional financial auditor.



The Presbytery has assigned Rev. Putnam to serve as interim for another church in the Presbytery and so Paul Penn, an experienced CRE, has been asked to meet our needs for authorized clergy during our time without a regular pastor.

What to do next. Well I thought I will add some applesauce, that should work. So I put in about a cup of applesauce, added some ginger, cloves and nutmeg. Everything is better with butter so added some butter and a little brown sugar. I was stirring this all up on the stove just to keep it warm and help the butter melt. Things were looking good. After I put it in the casserole dish I though it needed something extra so I decided to make a topping. More butter and brown sugar, nutmeg, chopped pecans and some dried mixed berries were thrown together, heated up and spread on top. I thought it looked pretty good. I was hoping for success.

So I had this blend of ingredients which I thought should be pretty good. I took it to a potluck dinner and I was expecting to get a taste of it to see if it was any good. I was near the end of the line when I went through and it was all gone! I had to scrape the sides of the bowl and the spoon to get enough where I could get a good taste. It was fabulous if I may say so myself. I am going to try it again soon.

I am often amazed when I try something new and it turns out good. Having had a few years experience in the kitchen I think I can get a sense of what new combos might work and what I might want to stay away from. But one can never tell. I have had failures too!

I try to take this same approach in getting to know people from varied backgrounds and life experiences. Life is not always simple or easy but I find we have more in common when I talk to them about what is important in their lives: their family, their work, maybe their faith. We are all more alike than different when you get to the core. I thank God that we have such differences in the human family. It helps me better appreciate the love God has for us that He gave us such a variety of people to enjoy. Thanks be to God!

PRISON MINISTRY NEWSLETTER February 2016

"There is a God shaped vacuum in the heart of every man which cannot be filled by any created thing, but only by God, the Creator made known through Jesus." Blaise Pascal

This world offers all kinds of gadgets to satisfy our wants. I have found in my own life that the material things do not satisfy the soul. Only God, through Jesus Christ, can satisfy our soul and give us inner peace! Sometimes a person has to lose everything to find Christ. When Christ is the center of our lives, we can go through any trial because we know He is present with us in the fire.

A young inmate I have been visiting with for the last five weeks is really excited about his new relationship with Christ. I asked him when he came to know the Lord as his Savior. He told me, "The first time I came into your office with another inmate, and as you prayed with him to trust Christ as his Savior, I prayed that prayer as well. I didn't know a person could feel so peaceful inside of prison. When I was arrested I wanted the police to kill me because I felt so empty and alone. I had nothing to live for anyway. Now that Christ is in my life, I cannot help but tell my brother about Jesus, because he is living the way I did on the outside! I get so tired of hearing sinful talk around me, but then I remember that I used to talk that way as well, so I can't get mad at them." As Pascal said, only Jesus can fill the, "God shaped vacuum in the heart of every man."

Some of the men who have come back to prison a number of times feel so defeated and worthless. I found a good video skit and was able to use it in my Bible study. It is about how God does not make any junk, and we are His masterpiece. In it God states that He loves each person too much to leave them the way they are, so He will chisel away at them with His discipline. The chiseling hurts but it is for our good. They go on to say that we are not to judge ourselves by what other people say about us, but by what God says about us. At the end it says that you are God's masterpiece. Some of the inmates have been put down by others for so long that they believe there is no hope for them. One of the men told me, "Watching this skit almost brought me to tears." I continue to encourage them that God is very good at putting broken people together!

Please continue to pray for these men as they struggle with past put downs. Many inmates feel rejected mainly by their fathers who were not around for them. They struggle to understand what a good relationship is. Only Jesus can heal and even restore family relationships!

Susan's Saga

Waiting. It's something most of us don't particularly like to do, whether it's a long line or being stopped at



a pokey red light when we're running late or being tangled up in traffic. In today's fast-paced life, even TV commercials are quick, geared to people's short attention spans.

But maybe waiting is a relevant topic, even if it's not our preference. It turns out that there is quite a bit of waiting in our lives, even though we squirm, wanting fast solutions to everything, from our computers to our personal problems.

There are plenty of examples of waiting in the Bible, starting in Genesis. The patriarch, Abraham, was 75 years old when he started out for the Promised Land. He had no children. It was another 25 years before his promised heir, Isaac, was born. It was a long wait.

That is an encouraging example in the area of Bible translation, where projects can take a long time. Even though our human nature can be impatient, yearning for quick results, the reality is that it's a process that can't be sped up.


In the New Testament, there is a Greek word that is frequently used: *hupomone* - which is translated as 'perseverance' or 'patient endurance'. We are often admonished to stick it out, to keep on keeping on. The Christian faith isn't necessarily a quick fix; the view is long range.

Whatever our situation, whether the extended challenge of Bible translation, or a sticky problem that defies resolution, or an on-going situation that is difficult, we can gain encouragement from the New Testament writers to keep on persevering, to not give up.
