
# VISION MEETING




# UPCOMING YOUTH EVENTS


Applications can be picked up in the church office and are due March 31st.

I love to read but don't always make the commitment to do it. I am trying to change that. The kind of books I usually prefer to read are non-fiction histories, mysteries, and novels that involve building or strengthening relationships – how people figure out getting along with each other and themselves. Anne Tyler is one of my most favorite authors.

I am getting a new favorite author, Swedish author Fredrik Backman. His book *A Man called Ove* could have been written about me in some part. It's about an old curmudgeon fellow and his neighbors. Because I found this an excellent read, I thought I would see how any other story of his held up. I next chose his *And Every Morning the Way Home Gets Longer and Longer*. Wow, I was not disappointed!

This little book, and it is a little book, is a beautiful read and I would recommend it for any one of any age but the story is mostly centered around a grandfather and his grandson. Their dialogue is very interesting and very moving. There was one part of the story that struck me especially. The boy was telling his grandpa about a school assignment. The teacher asked him to write an essay on the meaning of life. The grandpa asked him "What did you write?" The boy answered, "Company". The grandpa thought and said it was the best answer he'd ever heard. The boy said the teacher said he had to write a longer answer. "So what did you do" his grandpa asked. "I wrote: Company. And ice cream." The grandpa thought for a bit then said, "What kind of ice cream?" The boy and the grandpa understood each other.

That is the meaning of life. Company. It is all in one word but what a word. It has several meanings but the one that fits best here is fellowship. Jesus said that there are but two commands: love God and love one another. What better way to demonstrate love for God and for one another than to seek fellowship. Fellowship with God: walking, talking, studying, praying, meditating. Fellowship with one another: sharing activities, interests, walking, talking, and just hanging out. Being there to support each other in times of trouble. We need to understand how much we need one another.

Jesus came to teach us how to live with one another, to love one another, to be there for people who are ill or infirm. Folks who are in jail, those who are suffering from all kinds of distress, these are folks we are to love and serve. We need to arrive at understanding each other.

And then there is ice cream! At Men's Brotherhood each month we serve a great meal. And the dessert is almost always ice cream. Great company. With ice cream. What kind? Join us and find out.

The Great Divorce by iconic Christian theologian C.S. Lewis is a must read (or, for some of us, RE-read) for anyone who enjoys exploring the concepts of heaven and hell through an allegorical eye.

First published in 1946, this short works takes the reader on "a fantastic bus ride from hell to heaven – a round trip for some but not for others," according to the book's cover. Unexpectedly finding himself in a strange, gloomy town at an eerie bus stop, the narrator encounters a cast of unusual characters, some ghost-like and some solid and known as "bright persons," each with a particular story and a once-in-a-lifetime

decision to make.

In the Preface, Lewis acknowledges that *Divorce* is in part responsive to the work by "genius" William Blake *The Marriage of Heaven and Hell*, written in the late 1700s. And in the 150 years between the works – and ever since – our attempts at defining Heaven and Hell have continued to spark debate, speculation, and wonder. Lewis offers no concrete answers, but instead challenges us to ponder just what makes someone fit for either destination:

"...I think earth, if chosen instead of Heaven, will turn out to have been, all along, only a region in Hell; and earth, if put second to Heaven, to have been from the beginning a part of Heaven itself...."

(Preface, The Great Divorce).

This volume is on loan to our Church Library from my own collection, in hopes many members of our congregation will enjoy it, either for the first time or again!

Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, sincere compassion, and sound judgment should be chosen for this ministry. (The PC(USA) Book of Order)
