

#### **Revelings for March 2021**

#### Community Is.... about managing conflict

#### Matthew 18:15-20

<sup>15</sup> 'If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. <sup>16</sup>But if you are not listened to,



take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. <sup>17</sup>If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector. <sup>18</sup>Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. <sup>19</sup>Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. <sup>20</sup>For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'

Bret Lamsma's series on community has been thought-provoking for us as we've been looking at his devotional insights over these last months.

Years ago, I would do anything to avoid a conflict, much less try to manage one, in my personal life, in my family, or in the various church/social groups I was a part of. While in seminary I came to understand more about myself personally, what being a healthy disciple of Jesus was all about, especially as a leader of any group/organization. During this time, I began to understand that conflict wasn't a negative thing, but rather was and could indeed be a positive thing.

It is during the times of conflict that we're broken open, the Holy Spirit stirs us to grow, in and through the situation at hand. So in the areas of what we would consider conflict in our lives and/or organizations, seeking God's Holy Wisdom and allowing the Holy Spirit to work in and through us, we should intentionally work together collaboratively.

We should be prayerfully working in ways so that compromise isn't an us against them, or person against person thing, but rather it willingly gives for the common good to be achieved. (I Cor. 13 comes to mind.)

Healthy relationships should not have passive aggressive type behaviors, nor name-calling or shouting matches, nor secret-keeping (unless it's a celebratory/good reason), as part of what makes up or is part of a relationship. Jesus taught much about this we read in the Gospels.

Sadly, many people will think of the aforementioned and automatically deem conflict as negative. Healthy relationships are about honestly sharing our thoughts, opinions, and/or feelings openly with others, even if we're in disagreement. The old saying, "it's ok to agree to disagree" is spot on. Part of our spiritual discipline and renewal for Lent could be to begin to practice this even in small ways in our lives. Is it easy, no, but better for us in the long run, yes.

Here's what Lamsma wrote about these verses in Matt. 18:15-20: "Our text from Matthew 18 has been a foundational principle for dealing with conflict. If you have a problem with someone, go and talk to them about it first before including other people. It seems pretty basic. But is also a foundational principle in community. Making a public complaint or using gossip or backstabbing will

bring about mistrust and break community. On the other hand, directly addressing issues in a spirit of Godly wisdom and love is a positive way of dealing with conflict. Conflicts will arise. Managing them indirectly and in a timely way is an important part of community. Is there anyone with whom you need to discuss a conflict? Dealing with that has the potential to make your community even stronger." Prayer: God, help us deal with conflicts wisely, and bring us into stronger relationships as a result. Amen.

May we give our lives in every aspect, to our loving God as part of our season of renewal during this year's season of Lent. Stay safe, strong, and well. Faithfully.

Recalling the Cosmic Comic, Swami Beyondananda's saying "We are not here to earn God's love, we are here to spend it."

So we are not here on a mission to earn God's love. It is a gift freely given because he loves us. What did we do before Christ died for us to "earn" God's love? Nothing. What can we do to "earn" God's love now? Nothing. But to demonstrate that we acknowledge His love for us, we heed His command to "Love one another, as I have loved you". #### SUSAN'S SAGA

In spite of the pandemic, progress on the translation of God's Word into the Mixtec language is continuing. Because the translation team can no longer safely meet face to face, we have had to rely more heavily on technology. We are using WhatsApp on our cell phones to be in communication. Three of us have computers, and two of the team have tablets, where we can see the updated translation in Mixtec. We use the internet so that we can each read what changes are being made, although we are in five different locations. Then we discuss the wording on our cell phones. Even though the internet and/or cell phone coverage frequently cuts out for one or more parties, we are still able to continue the translation project. We certainly would not have dreamed a year ago that this would be the way we would be working.


By God's grace, we were able to revise about 30% of the New Testament in Mixtec this past year. The revision process continues, as we hone and refine the revision to be both accurate to the original Greek text, and clear in Mixtec—an ongoing challenge, as the languages are so different.

Our commitment continues to be to see God's Word made available to this people group in their heart language.
