## **Outstanding Senior Presbyterian Award**

This year's Senior Presbyterian Award winner is Jan Jones and you might know her as someone who has experienced many challenges and opportunities that God has put in her path. She has travelled with a carnival, had a job interview during a tornado warning, and when she and Bob were expecting their first child they moved to an area where the nearest hospital was 65 miles away.

Confirmed as a Lutheran and married to a Methodist, Jan and Bob found a welcoming church home in the Presbyterian Church when living on the Pine Ridge reservation. Jan started her teaching career in Flandreau in the early 1960s and when Bob found a job teaching in Pine Ridge, they moved there "for just a short time". That short time turned

into 22 years. During these years, they had two children, son Corwin and daughter Erika. They first attended the Presbyterian Church in Pine Ridge, SD, where everyone was welcomed and all people, native and non-native alike, were treated with respect and grace. When they moved to Martin SD, they became members of the Lindsey Memorial Church. She and Bob raised their children while Jan completed her Master's degree and worked in curriculum development, teaching college classes, and teaching the native children. Living on the reservation gave Jan an insight into some of the most challenging situations and the greatest joys. Jan embraced the opportunities of work and family and being present "right where God wanted her to be". She saw the many difficult things at Pine Ridge, including the heartbreak of broken families, addiction, and mental illness but also the joy of truly reaching children and inspiring a love of learning. Jan was successful in her teaching career but more importantly, she cherishes the connections that she made with the people.

After Bob and Jan decided to move closer to his parents, Bob got a job in Flandreau and Jan stayed with Erika, their daughter, in Martin, SD for a year while she finished out her senior year of high school. Jan applied for a job in Brookings and became the vice-principal of the Brookings Middle School, later the Mickelson Middle School. This is the job interview that took place during a tornado warning! The First Presbyterian Church was a natural choice for Bob and Jan. We know that currently Jan blesses us with her voice in the choir but she has served in just about every committee and church position at one time or another. She's been an Elder, Clerk of Session, Deacon, Trustee, PNC member, Personnel Committee member, PW moderator, Sunday School teacher, Worship Committee member, Outreach member, Bible Study leader, Nominating Committee member, and been involved with the jail ministry and nursing home ministries with Bob. On the Presbytery level she was on the Committee on Ministry. She said, "I think that's about it". Her favorite role now is grandmother to four grandsons and one granddaughter. Jan has a positive outlook and feels that "God has always been there and I have strength from that".

**Prayer Concerns:** Pray that we can be a light to the world through the powerful message of how we live our lives.

**Action:** Worship God through reflecting God's love through service to everyone.

I recall a sermon I heard once where the speaker performed a demonstration with a candle. We were meeting in a hall where there were no windows so when he instructed an usher to turn out the lights, the room became completely dark. One literally could not see their hand in front of their face. He then lit a tiny candle, similar to a birthday cake candle. It was a tiny light but suddenly as our eyes became used to the change we were able to make out more and more distinct shapes from the former darkness. That little light transformed the room from complete pitch-black darkness. We were able to see more clearly. While it did not make the room completely bright as the other lighting had, nevertheless it made a real distinct difference.

After Easter I often think: now what? From Advent, through Christmas, Lent, Holy Week and Easter we have followed the story of Jesus' ministry carefully. The life He led was a powerful message to our world during His lifetime. How much more that message is needed now. Like the candle lit in darkness slowly transforms the shadows to the perceivable, Christ's message of love has slowly transformed our world from one of darkness to tremendous potential.

Now after our hearing the message of Christ's life, death and resurrection it is time to get to work. After His resurrection he met with more than 500 of his disciples including the apostles as He was in that area for the next 40 days. It is recorded that He met with them, ate with them and I presume taught them more about His message of love, and helped prepare them for the coming of the Holy Spirit and the great commission. (Matthew 28:19-20)

I think we too often think that the story of Christ is just about Christ. While it is, it is also about us. He lived and died that all humanity might have life and have it to the full. (John 10:10). While the resurrection at Easter is extremely significant for us, we cannot ignore the powerful message of Pentecost. Pentecost is a celebration of the Holy Spirit becoming a part of our lives. This should not be overlooked. The transformation of the apostles on the day of Pentecost shows what a powerful impact the Holy Spirit can have in our lives.

With belief in a triune God, can we relegate to a role of lesser significance the arrival of another member of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit? I hope none of us do. Just like the little light in the darkened room brought illumination to it, the Holy Spirit gave a powerful illumination to the life of Jesus and His message. This is truly significant! Not just for us personally but especially for others. We are that light reflecting to the world the love of Christ. Not through coercion but just reflecting love for one another in every situation. Being living and loving sacrifices. The Holy Spirit gives us the power and strength to do this. Thanks be to God!

## PRISON MINISTRY NEWSLETTER April 2017

Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. 12 For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places." Ephesians 6:11-12

There are physical wars with guns and bombs, and there are spiritual wars that go on in the mind of a person. Sometimes the evil one wins for a time in the life of a new believer, but if that person is born again from above, he will return to the Lord. God is always ready to forgive us and start over. It is essential that the inmates who receive Christ into their lives are discipled so they grow deep in the Lord. It is difficult to see the guys who get excited about the Lord for a time, then drift off with the worldly crowd. That frequently occurs when the men get settled into prison and some old friends from the world are all around them.

One of the men I visited with, and I believe is a Christian, was feeling the pull of the evil one. When I was visiting with him, I mentioned some things that are essential to the Christian faith. "There is only one Mediator between God and man, Christ Jesus. You must believe that Jesus is God in the flesh, and you can only be saved through the blood of Jesus." When I said that he said, "Funny you would mention that to me now because I am going through a spiritual battle. In fact when I woke up this morning the thought came to my mind that Jesus isn't God. I knew that was not right and now you confirm that truth to me."

Four years ago I worked with a young man who had just come into prison. He was trying to live the Christian life but strayed from it. Now after four years, he told me that he wanted to visit with me. He informed me that it was time to get right with the Lord again. His problem was that he had bitterness from his growing up years that kept him bound up and distant from God. I asked him if he wanted to give it to the Lord and he said he did. So in his own words he prayed a prayer of repentance.

Last week I was walking in the prison hallway when an inmate stopped me and wanted to ask me some questions. He told me that he has time in his cell to think about his past. He feels guilty about all the bad things he has done to people. He practices his religion but he still feels guilty and does not know how to get rid of the feeling of guilt. I explained the gospel to him and how he could have forgiveness if he would give his life to following Jesus. He told me that he would talk to me again later about this problem and thanked me for talking with him. I have passed this man in the hall many times over the years, and I believe the Lord is trying to get his attention. Pray for him, because the evil one will try to take the seed that was sown. I am truly blessed to have your support through your prayers and financial gifts! I hope you had a blessed Easter!

## Susan's Saga

In the 23rd chapter of Luke's Gospel, Luke concludes the traumatic events of that awful Friday with a remarkable narrative. Everyone is reeling



from the trauma of the crucifixion. Provision of a suitable place for the burial of the Lord came from an unlikely source. As the paragraph unfolds, Luke introduces a new character with "Behold..." indicating that the reader should take note, as something unexpected is about to happen. And Joseph of Arimathea comes on the scene. He was neither a relative nor an apostle nor a person from Galilee, yet he was compassionately willing to make his own rockhewn tomb available for the corpse of a crucified person. With a touch of irony, Luke notes that not only was this instrument of mercy a devout Jew, but he also was part of the Council that had directly instigated the crucifixion.

As one commentator put it, Luke expends an extraordinary amount of detail to describe this person. He is careful to note that he is from the town of Arimathea, which is in Judea. This man is a blue-blooded Jew from the heartland, not one of those hailing from the fringes, where there was a mixed population, for example, Galilee.

He is good and just. I took those adjectives as being descriptive of his character, until the commentator pointed out that this man was also a member of the Council – that is, the Sanhedrin – the very same body that had just viciously delivered the most innocent man in history to an unjust death. In sharp contrast to his cohorts, this man was not in agreement with their decision. Even out of such a virulent group bent on destroying Jesus, there came a ray of hope.

Not only was he markedly different, he was also brave and bold. He valiantly approached Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor, to ask for Jesus' body.

As we revised the translation of this passage, the Mixtec co-translators were full of questions. Maybe Joseph just happened to see Pilate. I explained that as Pilate was the top Roman official of that province, Joseph would have had to have been intentional in approaching him.

As the gravity of the situation dawned on them, one commented that Joseph had taken a big risk in approaching Pilate. By his action, he also demonstrated courage by going against the Council. It was daring of him to risk both the disfavor of the Sanhedrin and the ire of the Roman government.

A more sobering question they asked was, what if Joseph of Arimathea had not come forward? Several sources indicate that a crucified person might have been left unburied or been consigned to a pauper's grave.

By his pious act, Joseph was probably not aware that he was unwittingly fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah 53: 9. He most likely did not realize that the sepulchre was only a temporary holding space for this unique Person. It was astounding that a member of the Council would graciously provide his own tomb for the Lord. But the biggest surprise was just around the corner.....
