
Our Friends

P.S. Thank you LaVonne Broksieck, for the use of the post-hole digger.


MEN'S BROTHERHOOD

Scripture Reading: Genesis 4:9 Then the Lord said to Cain, "Where is your brother Abel?" "I don't know," he replied. "Am I my brother's keeper?"

Quote: "Love is our true destiny. We do not find the meaning of life by ourselves alone - we find it with another." — Thomas Merton



Prayer Concerns: Pray that we can be hospitable and kind to everyone.

Action: Be actively seeking opportunities to reach out to others.

Genesis 4:9 Am I my brother's keeper? Who is our brother? What does it mean "to keep" our brother? A definition of "keep" is to take care of, to be responsible for, to watch over, to know what is happening with them. This not intended to mean controlling the other person's life, merely to be aware of what is happening to them. Who is my brother? Anyone who does God's will (Mark 3:35) plus any human being created by God.

A question I always have with this passage is: Which was the greater sin, the murder of Abel, or lying to God? God already knew what had happened to Abel but when he asked Cain He may have wanted to know how Cain would answer. Many if not all of us have been in a similar situation, probably when we were children and had done something we shouldn't have. Our parents asked us about it and we had a choice, lie or tell the truth. Often, they knew the situation and what we had done or not done, but they wanted to give us the chance to come clean. Lying usually got us into deeper hot water than if we had just told the truth and asked for mercy. Lying is a sin and sin separates us from the love of God and being connected to one another. Cain's sin shamed him and separated him from his family and from God.

So, when we are asked about our brothers, sisters, mothers, or fathers, about how they are, how will we answer? Do we know? Whether it is the family in the church or the general population, do we know how they are? Who are doing well and need our encouragement? Who are hurting and how can we help or offer support?

It is so easy to get absorbed in our own lives that we lose track of those around us, either near or far away. Work, household chores and other personal responsibilities have a way of dominating our daily activities. I wonder if it weren't for the scriptural passages that encourage us to watch over, to "keep" our fellow humans, would we seek the time to do it? Seek time to stay connected? But we must. It is good for both the body and the soul.

James Lynch is quoted in Jean Maalouf's book on kindness "The mandate to 'Love your neighbor as yourself' is not just a moral mandate. It's a physiological mandate. Caring is biological. One thing you get from caring for others is you are not lonely. And the more connected you are to life, the healthier you are."

There is a benefit to the community plus to one's self when we practice hospitality, kindness, reaching out – connecting to others is love. And a benefit to us as well.

But we don't need to sit back and wait for others to come into our life. Be proactive and seek out or create new opportunities to connect. We are our brother's keeper.


