

The financial report through the end of August could use some explaining. The UCC income was from a six-month agreement (Nov 15 to May 15) we had with the United Church of Christ for sharing a minister. The amount of money was based upon the percentage of time spent at each church and covered salary and benefits for Rev Kaul. Without that income, it appears that our monthly expenses are exceeding our income. This trend may be a concern since we have reduced our expenses as much as we can.

### HALL OF FAME 2021 Recognition Given by South Dakota Senior Games Association September 10, 2021

I started a program of serious long distance running during my thirties. It turned into an obsession of nearly ten miles per day and more than 3,000 miles per year over a period of ten years, culminating in a national ranking in the marathon at age forty-five, when I ran the Lincoln Marathon in 2 hours and 44 minutes. My bowed legs finally gave out after more than 30,000 miles of pounding the pavement. Knee replacement on one leg and upper tibia osteotomy on the other put an end to that career.



My wife, Judy, and I moved to Brookings in 1999. A few years later, the State Senior Games came to town. Somewhere I saw the schedule and yearned to be able to get back into a competitive activity. I knew that running wasn't in the game for me, but there must be something I could do! So 40 some years after high school I thought I maybe could throw the Discus again. Think again. I couldn't remember how to turn (we call it the spin) or much of anything else for that matter. I accidentally met up with the SDSU throws coach and we started talking. One thing led to another, and she invited me to join up with she and the University throwers. She agreed to help me learn the discus throw. I was an excited and willing student and with her help, I managed to relearn much of the technique well enough to finish third in the Discus that year. I was encouraged and was sixth in the nation in discus for my age group a few years later.

After competing fairly well in the discus throw at Regional and State Games in South Dakota, I explored the possibility of additional events. I had never picked up a shot or a javelin. Those events, still works in progress, have joined with the Discus and I have enjoyed all three for several years.

I have been pleased to serve as a member of the SD Senior Games Board of Directors for several years and have tried to be useful. I am very humbled and honored to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. —"Never quit —Never give up" Richard L. (Dick) Smith



### Revelings for October

"The Demonstration of the Mind of Christ"

The late Rev. Dr. Eugene Peterson's Message Translation of the Bible, sometimes gets the point of God's Word across to us more clearly, in ways that may just surprise us. That's the case with Philippians 3:4-14 as Paul describes how he'd like for those in this church he founded at Philippi to think, behave and believe. Paul desires that they, like he himself, must "put on Christ," specifically acquire and put on "the mind of Christ" in themselves and daily. Read the passage below:



Philippians 3:4-14 The Message 2-6 Steer clear of the barking dogs, those religious busybodies, all bark and no bite. All they're interested in is appearances—knife-happy circumcisers, I call them. The real believers are the ones the Spirit of God leads to work away at this ministry, filling the air with Christ's praise as we do it. We couldn't carry this off by our own efforts, and we know it—even though we can list what many might think are impressive credentials. You know my pedigree: a legitimate birth, circumcised on the eighth day; an Israelite from the elite tribe of Benjamin; a strict and devout adherent to God's law; a fiery defender of the purity of my religion, even to the point of persecuting the church; a meticulous observer of everything set down in God's law Book. 7-9 The very credentials these people are waving around as something special, I'm tearing up and throwing out with the trash—along with everything else I used to take credit for. And why? Because of Christ. Yes, all the things I once thought were so important are gone from my life. Compared to the high privilege of knowing Christ Jesus as my Master, firsthand, everything I once thought I had going for me is insignificant—dog dung. I've dumped it all in the trash so that I could embrace Christ and be embraced by him. I didn't want some petty, inferior brand of righteousness that comes from keeping a list of rules when I could get the robust kind that comes from trusting Christ—God's righteousness.

**10-11** I gave up all that inferior stuff so I could know Christ personally, experience his resurrection power, be a partner in his suffering, and go all the way with him to death itself. If there was any way to get in on the resurrection from the dead, I wanted to do it.

Focused on the Goal 12-14 I'm not saying that I have this all together, that I have it made. But I am well on my way, reaching out for Christ, who has so wondrously reached out for me. Friends, don't get me wrong: By no means do I count myself an expert in all of this, but I've got my eye on the goal, where God is beckoning us onward—to Jesus. I'm off and running, and I'm not turning back.

As we continue with our third lesson of "Equipping for Ministry in the 21st Century" the question, "What does the mind of Christ lived out in a regular person look like?" is asked. That's such a great question for us today. What constitutes then what a regular person looks like, much less the mind of Christ lived out in such person, can become a challenge for/to us. Over and over in scripture we're reminded of how counter-cultural God is and how God works in the world. We're reminded of how counter-intuitive God is and how God works things out for us.

In this lesson from The Layman, Winter 2014 is written, "Paul recognizes the ultimate exchange of his mind for the mind of Christ. He "gets it" that the secret of being content is not all the stuff of the world or the relative happiness we might experience in a fleeting moment. He knows that the joy of being in relationship with the Father through Jesus Christ and living a Spirit-filled and God-directed life is a far more rich and worthy than anything the world can give. Add to that the profound reality that the world cannot take it away and you have the kind of joy Paul experiences in every moment of life, no matter the circumstances. Paul helps us see what the mind of Christ operating in a regular man looks like. It provides a pattern for us to follow."

I think that the same can and must be said of Jesus too, long before Paul wrote what he did to the church at Philippi. One question that was asked in this lesson above, was, "So, is the same mind in you that was in Paul?" I'll add further, "is the same mind that was in Jesus Christ, the Son of God in each one of us? And one more question from the lesson, "How are you doing that for Christians in the spiritual generation coming along after you?"

How are we setting the example for those coming after us? As I think of this question, the words as prayer come to mind from the hymn, "As I went down to the river to pray." Let us pray: Refrain: As I went down to the river to pray, studyin' about that good old way, and who shall wear the starry crown, good Lord, show me the way. 1 Oh, sisters/brothers/children/sinners, let's go down, let's go down, won't you come on down. (repeat) to the river to pray. Good Lord show me the way, Amen.


