Prayer Concerns: Pray that we may be encouraged to do good.

Action: Find good things to do for one another. Let our light shine.

What is evil? What does it mean to do evil? A definition of evil is to be immoral; morally wrong or bad. Doing things that are not moral. To contrast, being good or moral is practicing right conduct. So we could say that to overcome evil is to be moral, to follow rules of right conduct. Crowding out evil by practicing moral or good behavior.

Susan's Saga

The last Sunday of the month of August is celebrated as Bible Sunday in Mexico. It is a chance to re-focus on the centrality of God's Word in our lives.

However, if the Bible were only available in the original source languages (mostly Hebrew for the Old Testament and Koiné Greek for the New), then it would be as if this precious book were in chains. One wouldn't be able to open the covers to see what is inside, much less leaf through the pages, reading the content.

Bible translation can be likened to the key that unlocks the padlock holding the chains in place. Without translation, the original text would still be chained.

The majority of the Bible was first translated into English by John Wycliffe, who died in 1384. Later translators, such as William Tyndale and Miles Coverdale, continued the quest of having God's Word accessible to people in English. These early translators suffered for their desire to produce the Bible for English speakers, and many were persecuted and even burned at the stake.

There are now a variety of translations in English. They have the common purpose of making God's Word clear, so that we can grasp the essential life-giving message the Bible contains.

However, there are still at least 1600 living languages in the world which do not yet have a translation. It is as if God's Word were still in chains for those people groups. Bible translation today continues to provide the key to unlocking God's Word.

Thank you for your part in being part of the process of providing the key for a group of Mixtec-speaking people in southern Mexico.

PRISON MINISTRY NEWSLETTER September, 2019

God makes it clear that the wages for our sin is death. That is what we deserve, but praise God, He sent Jesus Christ to take the punishment we should have received! There is no greater love than this!

One of the men who returned to prison for a short time, was the man who I talked with many times in Segregation. He could be very sarcastic to me as I made my rounds. He told me "I have been out six weeks and now I am back on a parole detainer (which means only for a short time). I have done 6 years in prison and thought I had things figured out. Obviously, I don't know how to make it out there." He had tears in his eyes and God had broken his pride. He said, "You know I was prideful and sarcastic to you, but I know now I can't do this on my own! I need to change and evidently I need God in my life." I explained the gospel by diagramming Romans 6:23. He told me, "I definitely need Jesus in my life!" He prayed to invite Jesus Christ to take over his life and trusted Christ as his Savior! Praise the Lord for so great a salvation!

Bob (not his real name), returned to Jameson Annex from another facility. When a man comes back to Jameson Annex, it is usually because they got in trouble at the other prison. I knew him when he first came into prison, because I visited several times. The Lord was working on him at that time. Bob told me how he got in trouble again and had to come back to Jameson. He said, "I am just so full of hate, I don't know what to do. I need to change; I cannot go on living like this." I went over the gospel with him by drawing it out. I told him, "You have to ask the Lord to forgive you for your sins, cleanse you from your hate, and fill you with the love of Christ." He did pray and when he was finished, he smiled and said, "Man that was something!" He was excited about getting into the Bible.

It was a blessing to have a Life Light event on the prison recreation yard this past Saturday! There was great music, and professional bike riders who rode BMX bikes doing flips in the air. The speaker told his story about his difficult childhood, and how the Lord had taken him out of his mess through a pastor who took him into his home. He had family members who had been in prison, but God saved him from coming to prison. Many of the inmates were very thankful for this program. God is at work touching lives through these events.

Please pray that the new believers will become strong and mature in the Lord. Thank you for blessing us with your prayers and financial support!
