

Ding, Dong, The Time has Come!

It is time to think about ringing our bells again. The adult bell choir will begin at 7:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 8. Anyone 18 and older with experience ringing bells is welcome to come to this rehearsal. If you are interested but unable to attend, please contact Elizabeth Fox at Elizabeth.fox@sdstate.edu or 605-691-5211.

For youth and beginning ringers, we will have a meeting after church on Sunday, September 8 to talk about when we want to rehearse. We should be done meeting by noon. Please bring your planners to this meeting so we can find times to meet. This group will focus on the mechanics of ringing to improve the basics and will begin ringing hymns as well as change ringing. Beginning ringers do not need to be able to read music yet. This group will be focused on learning and having fun. The group will perform in church at least once during the year but may play more depending on their confidence and desire.

Handbells such as the ones we have, were originally designed to allow change ringers to practice outside their church towers. Imagine if we had 8 or 12 bells in our church tower and several of us wanted to win at bell ringing competitions. The hours of practice we would put in would be heard throughout the neighborhood. Now imagine you are not one of the ringers but lived a house or two away from the church. Constant practicing would become very tedious. The handbells allowed practice of the music without disturbing the neighbors.

Change ringing is the practice of ringing tower bells in a pattern. If you have ever watched a movie set in Victorian times (or the periods just before or after) that had a wedding in it, you probably hear the bells ringing from high to low in a somewhat rhythmic pattern. If you continued to listen, the pattern would change with repetition. Instead of 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, it would become 1, 3, 2, 5, 4 for a couple times and then it would become 3, 1, 5, 2, 4 and it would keep changing in a specific pattern until the ringers ended up with 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 again. This should all be done in strict rhythm but when ringing bells in a tower, that is incredibly difficult to do. Change ringing is the practice of ringing a pattern with a change in the repetitions. It takes skill, practice, and a lot of concentration and can be great fun.

If you enjoy television murder mysteries and would like to see one about bell ringers out of control, try the Midsomer Murders from the BBC, episode titles Ring Out Your Dead.



PRISON MINISTRY NEWSLETTER August 2019

God is always at work around us. This is one thing that Henry Blackaby' emphasizes in his study, "Experiencing God", (the Bible study we are using at the prison). If we are going to join Him in His work, we will have to adjust our lives and thinking to what He is asking us to do. We have to be available to join Him in His work. It is only in His strength that we do His work. John 15:5 makes it clear, "For without Me you can do nothing." God is always at work in the prison drawing broken people to Himself! The stories I hear from men about their broken and shattered lives, I know only God can fix. I am thankful to be able to give them hope!

One of the men who is in prison temporarily, requested to visit with me. He told me he did 10 years in prison before coming back for a short time. He never was that interested in Christianity during the first 10 years.

This time he found himself thinking more about getting his life right with God. I went over the plan of salvation with him and explained that apart from Jesus Christ there is reason to fear death. Then he said to me, "It is interesting that the other night I was thinking about death and it struck fear in my heart. I do not know what would happen to me if I died and now here, we are talking about how to get rid of the fear of death." His eyes were tearing up when he said, "I really need to get right with God. I went to church growing up, but I never took it seriously." I told him it was the Lord who brought the thought of death to his mind and his need to get right with the Lord. He prayed for Christ to forgive his sins and invited Jesus to be his Lord and Savior! He was very thankful for finding peace with God! Praise the Lord at how He works in the lives of people to draw them to Himself!

It is a blessing that inmates can watch TBN Christian broadcasts in their cells. We had the opportunity to have the TBN (Trinity Broadcasting Network) tour group, called "2nd Chance", put on a two-hour program at the prison. The program was very beneficial for the men as they sang praises, had times of laughter, heard a message from Psalm 1, about the importance of getting right with God. The men were encouraged in the Lord!

Continue to pray for the incoming and outgoing inmates. Pray that the men who come to Christ in prison will grow deep in the Lord! Thank you for your prayers and financial support! You are a blessing!
